Outdoors or In?

I hold two pieces of mail in my hands and look from one to the other, wondering where the truth lies. One hand holds a free newsletter from a community hospital warning parents to protect their children from the dangers of sunlight, pollen, poisonous plants, and insect bites. In the other hand lies our local paper with a front-page article about a kindergarten class that is learning to protect the beauty of nature by recycling.

Momentarily the two messages merge into one image. I picture the kindergarteners coated with sunscreen and insect repellent, clad in dark glasses, sun visors, high boots, long pants, and full-length sleeves. I imagine their eyes anxiously scanning the skies for acid rain and the grass for deer ticks, as they edge their way outdoors to build an appreciation for the natural world.

There has been a growing trend in recent years to view the outdoors as threat to our families' health. Skin cancer, Lyme disease and allergic reactions to pollen are not to be ignored. But by over-emphasizing the risks of being outside, we have a great deal to



lose. To often our children are hearing what amounts to a confusing message: "The outdoors can make you sick. Preserve and protect it!"

If we pass along to our children the message that being outdoors is risky, they have much to lose. Our lives, as a rule, are limited by what we fear. Children kept indoors miss opportunities that gently rouse their sensory systems of touch, smell, hearing and sight. They miss the scent of freshly cut grass or its tickle against their hands. They miss the chirping of birds, the distant sound of a dog barking, or the breezy rustle and stir of leaves overhead. And, they miss the freedom to do what comes naturally to all children: run, shout, play hard and test their strength and independence.

The rest of us have much to lose as well. If the outdoor world is presented as a health hazard why should our children or chil-



dren's children want to care for it as adults?

I believe we need to set reasonable and balanced guidelines for our children, ones that don't create fear. Teach children to use sunscreen when needed, but also teach them to rejoice in sunny days. Teach them to avoid stinging bees, but to savor the honey. Show them poison ivy so they won't touch it, but also show them wild clover so they can pick it. Have them wear raincoats and boots, but let them splash in puddles. Give them allergy medication when it's needed, but also give them a love, not a fear, of being outdoors.

Spring is finally here! It seems like the year has flown by. I've enjoyed working with your four-year-old students this year. Thank you for all the ways you volunteered, especially, by helping with parties and field trips and assisting in class. You make all the difference. We could not accomplish all that we did without you.

During March and the first part of the April the children studied pond life to prepare for our field trip to Slate Run Wetlands. We studied insects especially dragonflies, frogs, turtles, fish and ducks. Our dramatic play center was Slate Run Wetlands complete with a nature center, picnic area, and two ponds. The children explored characteristics and stages of these animals. They dramatized **Jump Frog**

Jump by Robert Kalan. We read **Fish is Fish** by Leo Lionni and read and sang **Over in the Meadow** by Ezra Jack Keats. During the week on ducks all classes made experience charts. The MWF classes also drew ducks in unexpected places after I read **Make Way for Ducklings** by Robert McCloskey.

In addition the children have begun to play in our dramatic play center "Columbus Zoo."

We are learning zoo animal related songs. They enjoyed the reading/singing of **Going to the Zoo** by Tom Paxton.

On April 17/18 we had a special visitor, The Turtle Lady, who share her turtles, bearded dragon lizards and snakes with us.

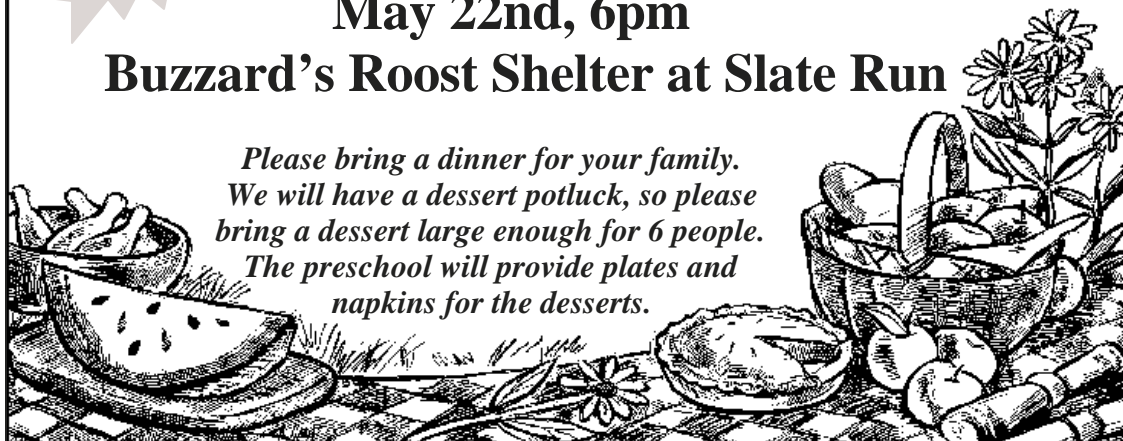

Featured Recipe

Wiggle Worm Dirt Pudding



Ingredients:

- 1 pkg of Oreo cookies, crumbled
- 2 cups cold milk

- 1 pkg chocolate instant pudding
- 1 small container of Cool Whip
- 1 pkg of gummy worms

Directions:

- Put cookies into a zipper style bag and close tightly.
- Using a rolling pin, roll and crush the cookies until crumbly. Set aside.
- In a large bowl, pour the milk and chocolate instant pud-

ding mix.

- Whisk well until all of the pudding mix is dissolved.
- Let stand 5 minutes.
- Add the Cool Whip and 1/2 of the crushed cookies.
- Stir until well blended.
- Place a large spoonful of crushed cookies into the bottoms of the plastic cups.
- Add the pudding mixture on top of that until the cups are

3/4 full.

- Add 1 large gummy worm so that it is half in the cup and 1/2 hanging out of the cup.
 - Spoon in more crushed cookie around the worm to hold it in place.
 - Can top with Cool Whip if desired.
 - Serve chilled.
- *You can use as many worms in the pudding as desired.

Summer Safety Tips

From the American Academy of Pediatrics

Playground Safety

- The playground should have safety-tested mats or loose-fill materials (shredded rubber, sand, wood chips or bark) maintained to a depth of at least 9 inches. The protective surface should be installed at least 6 feet (more for swings and slides) in all directions from the equipment.
- Equipment should be carefully maintained. Open "s" hooks or protruding bolt ends can be hazardous.
- Swing seats should be made of soft material such as rubber, plastic or canvas.
- Make sure children cannot reach any moving parts that might pinch or trap



any body part.

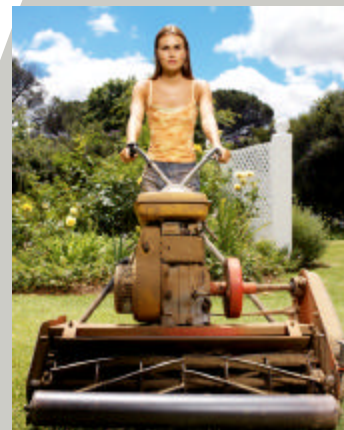
- Never attach—or allow children to attach—ropes, jump ropes, leashes, or similar items to play equipment; children can strangle on these.
- Make sure metal slides are cool to prevent children's legs from getting burned.
 - Parents should supervise children on play equipment to make sure they are safe.

Lawn Mower Safety

- Try to use a mower with a control that stops the mower from moving forward if the handle is let go.
- Children younger than 16 years should not be allowed to use ride-on mowers. Children younger than 12 years should not use walk-behind mowers.
- Make sure that sturdy shoes (not sandals or sneakers) are worn while mowing.
- Prevent injuries from flying objects, such as stones or toys, by picking up objects

from the lawn before mowing begins. Have anyone who uses a mower wear hearing and eye protection.

- Do not pull the mower backward or mow in reverse unless absolutely necessary, and carefully look for children behind you when you mow in reverse.
- Always turn off the mower and wait for the blades to stop completely before removing the grass catcher, unclogging the discharge chute, or crossing gravel paths, roads or other areas.
- Do not allow children to ride as passengers on ride-on mowers.



Five Simple Ways to Be A More Playful Family

1. Encourage your kids to play, laugh, and use their imaginations.
2. Use your own imagination. Make your family's everyday routine more playful and fun.
3. Introduce your kids to many types of play: indoor and outdoor, active and quiet; running, climbing, throwing, drawing, pretending, story telling, solving puzzles, playing games and more.
4. Provide a mix of play settings: independent play; activities with playmates, and family playtime.
5. Respect playtime and its rituals as much as you do mealtime, bed time, and other routines. It's just as important.
