## Navigating Ups & Downs Of the Second Semester

In the following route description of your child's second semester, you'll see some possible ups and downs (not all children will be at the same place in a given month), along with suggestions for how new travelers might navigate them.

### January

**Up:** Your child seems happy to be back in a regular school routine with the excitement of the holidays behind her.

**Down:** Suddenly, for parents, the next academic year abruptly looms closer. Like many parents, you may begin to wonder if your child will be ready for the giant step forward into kindergarten or first grade.

- Next September is still nine months away. Don't mortgage your child's opportunity to be three or four by stressing next year's academic expectations. True readiness for learning lies in feeling competent and capable at one's current age, in looking forward to new experiences, in being comfortable in a group of other children, and in having lots of opportunities to run, climb, and play.

### February

**Up:** In the classroom, you may notice that children's capacities for sustaining interest in play activities have increased. The time they spend on one activity increases. They

may return day after day to block building, artwork, or pretend play, with the experience becoming more complex over time.

**Down:** Colds, flu, and other illnesses see, to peak at this time of year. Children miss days of school and the flow of their activities and interactions with others is interrupted.

- The average preschooler is estimated to catch at least four to six colds per year. Careful handwashing with soap and warm water at school and at home can make a tremendous difference. Be sure to review your school's policy about illness. You may need to keep your child home or make other arrangements when he or she is ill. Do this for the benefit of the other children and for your own child.

### March

**Up:** The hint of spring is in the air.

**Down:** But it's only a hint. The days are still short, sometimes rainy, windy and cold, and the children become restless indoors.

- Be sure to send along mittens, boots, and other cold weather gear every day to make it easier for caregivers to take your child outdoors. Provide opportunities for vigorous



physical play at home, as well, or take a few moments for a quick family walk outside before or after your evening meal. A few moments outside in the fresh air can result in children who will later play more contentedly indoors.

### April

**Up:** The children feel completely at home in school.

**Down:** Children seem to slip backwards in behavior, behav-

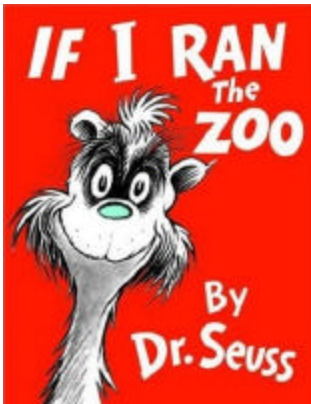
ship God, but celebrate the gifts of children.

Copies of the book are available to order so that your child can have the book signed the day of the reading. Please fill out the form below and turn it and payment into your teacher by April 1st.

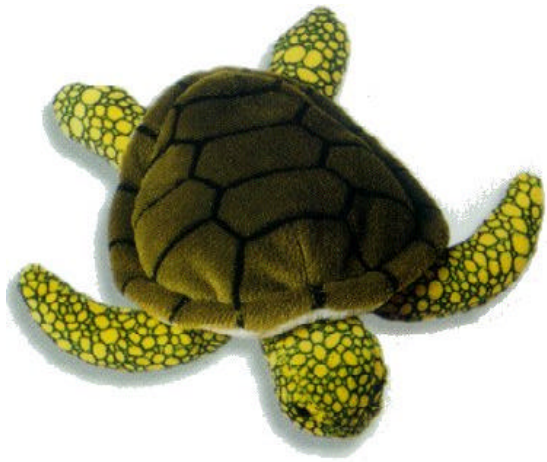

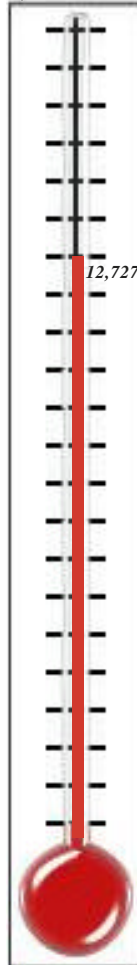

17,000 Labels



The Campbell's Labels contest started the first of February. The containers on the first and second floors have been checked and it looks like we need to start bringing in quite a few more labels if we want to meet our goal of 7,000 labels for the year. As of this newsletter, we have a total of 12,727 labels banked. We need to collect about 4,273 more to reach our goal for this year. If you have friends and family members saving labels, make sure you get in touch with them to get the labels and bring them in.

We just learned that if our school submits 5,650 total points in UPC/lids from 8/1/2007 to 6/30/2008 our school will receive a 1,150 point bonus which will be deposited into our school's account after 8/1/2008.

Notice that the points sheets are lying out on the tables outside each classroom. If they have all been taken, let us know and we will make sure to refill the pile.

The contest will continue through March. By looking at our contest graph, we have a long way to go! So bring those labels in!

# Apple Pie



## Ingredients:

2 12"-pie crust rounds  
6 large Apples\* peeled, cored and cut into 16ths

2 tbsp cold butter cut into tiny pieces  
4 tbsp sugar\* (depending on the sweetness of the apples)  
2 tsp cinnamon  
1/2 tsp freshly grated nutmeg  
1/2 tsp Apple Pie spice (optional)  
1/2 tsp Pure Vanilla Extract

## Directions:

Preheat oven to 400 F°.

Press first pastry round into pie plate and prick it all over on the bottom with the tines of a fork. Refrigerate the prepared bottom crust for 15 minutes while you

peel and season the apples.

Top crust should also be cold - so make sure it is in the fridge as well. Taste your apples and adjust the sugar - if they are sweet add less - tart add a bit more. Mix spices, sugar and vanilla in a large bowl. Toss peeled and sliced apples into the mixture.

Pour all into the refrigerated bottom crust. Dot with butter lumps about the size of your fingernail all over. Attach top crust (you can do decorative cutouts or decorations at this point for air holes).

We used cookie cutters to make the holes. Make air holes slits if you haven't done cut outs.

You can hold the pie for an hour or two in the fridge if you need to before baking.

Optional: Sprinkle a bit of sugar over the top crust before baking.

Bake in the preheated 400 F° oven for 10 minutes then reduce the heat to 350 F° for 25-40 minutes or until done.

# Common Sense Tips for a Healthy Media Diet for Young Kids



From *Common Sense Media*, a leading non-profit, non-partisan organization dedicated to improving the media lives of kids and families

Here are some tips that can help you use media to support your child's development and well-being during their early years:

**Set media time limits and stick to them.** Limit your child's screen time to no more than one to two hours per day. Children under the age of two should watch as little TV/videos as possible.

**Check media content and ratings at [www.common-sense-media.org](http://www.common-sense-media.org) to choose media that is age-appropriate and entertaining.** You might prerecord high quality shows or movies and let your kids watch them over and over. You may get bored, but your child learns through repetition.

**Location, location, location. No TV or computer in your child's bedroom.** Research shows that when media is located in kids' bedrooms, its negative influence on their development is greater.

**Watch and listen with your kids.** Ask questions such as, who was your favorite character? What was it about her/him that you liked? Which character would you like to be? You can also encourage your child to sing, clap, jump around, and dance with the characters.

**Use media to spark your child's imagination and creativity.** You can ask questions like: if you wrote the story, how would you change the ending? Would you add new characters? What would they look or act like? Also encourage your child to make up his/her own stories. You can make a book out of her/his drawings and write down the story.

**Help your child understand fantasy from reality.** Explain that children often imitate their favorite media characters. Remind your child that real people can't do things that cartoon characters or superheroes can—like jumping off buildings or falling out of a tree—without getting hurt.

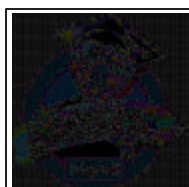
**Point out that violence isn't a good way to solve problems.** Offer nonviolent ideas of how to resolve problems if you're watching a show with characters that

solve arguments by hurting people. Ask your child if she has any ideas.

**Help your child avoid buying in to commercialism. Young kids cannot distinguish between ads and program content.** Help kids differentiate between commercials and programs, and help them understand that the purpose of an advertisement is to sell a product. You can also explain that advertisements often exaggerate the quality of the product to make it more appealing.

**Balance electronic media with playtime—push the remote button to "off" and encourage your kids to go outside and be active.**

**Read to your child and go to the library.** It's the best way you can build their literacy skills and help them establish a love of books.
