The Power of Welcoming

Jesus spoke to his disciples, saying, "Whoever welcomes you welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me... Whoever gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones in the name of a disciple – truly I tell you, none of these will lose their reward." Matthew 10: 40, 42

Jesus tells us that the one who welcomes either a prophet of a righteous person will one day receive the same reward the prophet or righteous person will receive. And then there's this curious phrase. The one who welcomes and gives even a cup of cold water to one of humble stature, will be rewarded. Giving a cup of cold water is a symbolic way of saying, "whenever you meet the need of the humblest of souls, all heaven takes note." It's easy to recognize and honor the spiritual heavyweights, but it takes a saint to care for 'these little ones.' We're reminded of Mother Theresa and her Sisters who sought out the dying in the gutters of Calcutta. She assured us that in serving others with Jesus' love, in the ways of God's welcoming hospitality - blessings will flow. God will bless us for being welcoming people.

Over the past month, I've had wonderful experiences of meeting with various small groups at David Lutheran. Together with council members, we've been working our way through a process of receiving thoughtful feedback about our Listening Team report from members who are part of fellowship and study groups, ministry teams and more. Groups have engaged the questions raised thoughtfully and creatively. In the process of meeting, I've observed how important these small groups are for their members, how vital these are for the connections made.

Small groups are places where in some cases, our members invite their friends who are welcomed. These are places I see you counting on one another for comfort and encouragement, for the challenge of study, the companionship of emotional and spiritual support, for fellowship and fun. At David Lutheran we have groups that meet over meals, others meet for the joy of reading books to explore hope in themes of loss and redemption, some meet for the purpose of serving like Rebecca Circle, our Quilter's and Sewing Group, those who serve a meal at First English Lutheran in Columbus, who provide ongoing care as Stephen Ministers. Our Dartball Team has fun connecting our members with folks from other churches. Our middle and high schoolers learn and play together, growing in faith and leadership skills whether meeting for youth group, leading special events like our recent Trunk or Treat Outreach together with adults, or growing their skills in our drama group, "Acts of Faith."

Council had its regular meeting on October 16, 2017. Some highlights include:

President Doug Snyder reported that he has conducted two small group meetings about the Synod Listening Post report. Both meetings went well and outreach to small groups within the church will continue. While some groups are not interested in meeting, it is up to Council to make the attempt.

Council Highlights cont.

Finance reported that 2018 budget is well underway. Council reviewed a draft budget and provided input. Council decided that some budget issues need to be brought to the congregation. Meetings will be held the first two Sundays in November to discuss the budget with members. There will be two meetings on each Sunday that will be scheduled around the Sunday Services. More details to follow in the weekly announcements.

Stewardship reported that 35 giving cards have been turned in for 2018 and they are continuing to collect them.

Youth reported that we had a very successful bible fundraising program this year. All the bibles have been purchased and distributed to our new preschoolers. We have 87 first time students in the Preschool this year. Acts of Faith started up in October to begin work on the Christmas program and approximately 20 youth are participating. Additional youth activities for later this month involve confirmation, the reformation breakfast, and trunk or treat.

Memorial Endowment requested that Council approve three grants. Council approved \$1600 for Jacobs Porch, \$1000 for First English, and \$7,025 for flooring and carpet in the Sunday school rooms, Ryan’s office, Pastor Leslie’s office, and the small conference room. The Fire Marshal will be asked to approve the materials before they are installed.



Unfortunately, member giving has not kept pace to cover our operating expenses. DELC finds itself at a \$60,000 loss through September when comparing actual income to actual expense.

Your council is diligently working on the 2018 budget to be presented to the congregation. Council has identified a few ideas to improve the 2018 financial position of the church and is very interested in member input as well. On Sunday, November 5th, I am facilitating two budget discussion opportunities. One at 9:00 am and another at 11:00 am. Those of us working on the budget for 2018 would welcome your thoughts at any time. Please approach Josh Thornton, John Hummel, Doug Snyder, Lisa Schacht or myself at any time. We need your input.

I found an ongoing sense of welcome in these groups for one another – that’s the ‘cup of cold water.’ This cup is a symbolic gift; it’s a deep acceptance that you are a child of God, with a place to belong.

A research project released a survey listing 48 reasons people had for joining a congregation. Here are the highest 7 ranked reasons: 1) I joined because of what the pastor was like as a person. 2) ...because members made me feel welcomed when I attended. 3) ...because the church helped me live a Christian lifestyle. 4) ...because I liked the worship services. 5) ...because it was a place where my children could be nurtured in faith. 6) ...because the pastor preaches good sermons. 7) ...because I felt something was missing from my life.

So wait... did you notice the 2nd highest factor? “Because people made me feel welcomed...” What was the 6th highest? “Good sermons.” **So what does this mean???** ***In other words, the power of welcoming on your part is more important than the power of the pastor’s preaching in helping people determine if they want to be here.*** This speaks powerfully to the ministry of ushers, greeters, those in the pews nearby our visitors. What you say to one another in the pews and over coffee and refreshments is more important to people feeling connected here at David Lutheran – more than what the pastor says from the front! (Don’t worry! I promise I won’t quit preaching...) We can’t undervalue the power of being a genuinely and deeply welcoming community. The quality of welcoming is a sign of what will happen later. If you are welcomed warmly in the first encounter, you might be able to trust that you may be loved and accepted later.


So thanks, dear ones, for welcoming one another in small groups, and for your welcome of our visitors who come here longing for connection. Together at David Lutheran, may we be open to the power of God at work within us to welcome others. Let’s be intentional about it. 
Daytime Book Club

The Daytime Book Club will meet Thursday, November 9th at 1 p.m. in the Chapel at David Lutheran Church. We will be discussing the book "A Man Called Ove" by Fredrik Backman.

Meet Ove. He's a curmudgeon—the kind of man who points at people he dislikes as if they were burglars caught outside his bedroom window. He has staunch principles, strict routines, and a short fuse. People call him “the bitter neighbor from hell.” But must Ove be bitter just because he doesn't walk around with a smile plastered to his face all the time?

Behind the cranky exterior there is a story and a sadness. So when one November morning a chatty young couple with two chatty young daughters move in next door and accidentally flatten Ove's mailbox, it is the lead-in to a comical and heartwarming tale of unkempt cats, unexpected friendship, and the ancient art of backing up a U-Haul. All of which will change one cranky old man and a local residents' association to their very foundations.

A feel-good story in the spirit of *The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry* and *Major Pettigrew's Last Stand*, Fredrik Backman's novel about the angry old man next door is a thoughtful exploration of the profound impact one life has on countless others. “If there was an award for ‘Most Charming Book of the Year,’ this first novel by a Swedish blogger-turned-overnight-sensation would win hands down” (*Booklist*, starred review).

They moved to Canal Winchester almost two years ago. After visiting several local churches, they decided to join David Lutheran. They were received into membership last October.





now a toddler of almost two years of age. Kathy and Bill are blessed to be babysitters for Warren 2-3 days a week.

U.S. Wildfires

The Situation:

A rage of more than a dozen wildfires has consumed parts of California in recent months, with one of the most ferocious in recent history erupting in Northern California. The explosive Valley fire has led to at least one death, displaced more than 10,000 residents and destroyed hundreds of homes. Thousands of acres of land have been destroyed as fire fighters struggle to keep up.

Our Response:

Lutheran Disaster Response, working with the Sierra Pacific Synod and Lutheran Social Services of Northern California, is monitoring the situation and communicating with those impacted. Many that have been impacted by the fires do not have insurance or are underinsured, which will make recovery that much more difficult. We stand ready to provide assistance in the long-term recovery efforts once the fires subside. As many organizations are quick to respond and available to assist, Lutheran Disaster Response will look to fill the long-term needs not met by the government or other organizations. Pastors and ELCA church members are reaching out in prayer, support and compassion, especially in response to the Valley fire. Following any major disaster, recovery is a long-term process, and your prayers and gifts are needed to assist those impacted by the fire to rebuild their homes and their lives.

What you can do:

Pray: Pray for those who are evacuated and whose homes and livelihoods have been destroyed, grant them peace and healing.

Give: Your gifts are needed now to help with immediate relief. **Gifts designated for U.S. Wildfires will be used in full (100 percent)** to assist those directly impacted.

Hurricane Relief

The Situation:

The world has been experiencing one of the highest concentration of major hurricanes in recent times. There have been at least sixteen named storms, five of which have impacted the U.S. mainland and/or territories, leaving widespread damage across Texas, Florida, Georgia Louisiana, Mississippi, Puerto Rico, Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Haiti, Cuba, the U.S. Virgin Islands.

Hurricane Irma and Maria

Lutheran Disaster Response is working with the Florida-Bahamas Synod, the Caribbean Synod, and other International companions and partners to provide relief to the most vulnerable in the U.S. and around the world.

In Florida, the initial response, in addition to local efforts at clean-up and providing temporary shelter, has focused on crisis counseling to thousands in 20 Florida counties. This work is being done through our affiliate, Lutheran Services of Florida. Early support has been extended to care providers so that they can be assured their families are in a stable living situation, and area able to turn their attention to the care of the most vulnerable in the community.

In Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, we're coordinating the delivery of critical items including dry food, generators, and solar-powered phones.

In Haiti, we're supporting woman-headed households and farmers who were affected by the hurricanes.

In Cuba, we're supporting the distribution of items like cookware, dishes, and blankets to help families get back to normal life.

Tropical Storm Nate

Through our companion church, Iglesia Luterana Costarricense (ILCO), we are planning an immediate response by providing food, access to clean water and other services. We will focus our efforts on indigenous communities along the central and southern parts of Costa Rica's Pacific Coast.
